

ALEXANDER LUFER

artist, b.1965

is an experienced Russian painter based in Germany whose work has been featured in solo and group shows internationally. With a background in architecture, Lufer developed his artistic practice inspired by the Dutch Vanitas and artists like Jeff Koons. Working in oil on canvas, he explores themes of technology and the tension between tradition and modernity through altered landscapes and unexpected still lifes.

He works in series, saing that it is the best way to develop artist's style and to avoid staying framed or pressured by one conception.

During the last 10 years the artist has been concentrating on technologies and how they influence art. He focuses on breaking the barrier between conventional traditional art and new technologies.

State of the art technologies make it possible to create a form that was inaccessible to the creators of previous generations, to go beyond prototypes and labels of meaning. An artist is no longer obliged to copy, reflexing and interpreting the reality, now more than ever he is able to create something fundamentally new. Just as the Internet freed up the text, allowing everyone to be the author and publisher, development of technology freed up the form, making it independent from nature, subordinating it to human imagination or artificial intelligence. Plastic arts like sculpture, painting, design etc. deal not only with form, but also with ideas, emotions and feelings. But the form was always much more important for plastic art than for example for music or literature. In his works Alexander Lufer asserts the primacy of form, its liberation and potential.



The New Things series is an attempt to define what the painting appearing with the return of FORM to the plastic arts might look like. A form that is no longer associated with mimesis, i.e. it is not an imitation of reality.

The possibility of free manipulation of the form, which is given to people by new technologies and the rapid processing of the coordinates of points in space, opens up unprecedented opportunities in the history of human civilization for the plastic arts.

Obviously, the founding fathers of abstract art, who considered form and mimesis a limitation, could not predict what turn history would take.


Form, now we know this for sure, not a limitation, but new degrees of freedom.








Vanitas - is a genre of painting born in the great Baroque era, allegorical still life, which compositional center is traditionally a human skull. A modern man or woman is striving for eternal life, the search pleasures, immersed in vanity. But vanity does not like when it is reminded of the transience of life and death. Anyway this series is not intended as a morality lesson, it is reflection of the transience of life and attitude to death from the point of view of a contemporary.

Symmetry runs through the whole history of art from the ancient times until now.

One of the tasks of the series "Before and After" is to overcome the inner resistance of technology which is crucial to creation of symmetrical images. What is perceived as a fault will soon be an asset.

Any artifacts, being separated into two parts, which are consequently self-reflected, obtain an additional dimension in time. It happens because each part carries recognizable features belonging to the whole and consequently turns into an object which went through a certain evolution process.

By means of symmetrical separation a new object, which previously existed only in space, gains a new dimension, namely time. In these works time "appears" in the process of division and the subsequent synthesis.

All points made above shall be considered in order to achieve the ultimate understanding of the series. It is particularly true for a question of time materialization prompted by symmetrical divisions and reflections. It is easily comprehended through the states of past and present or as a barely perceptible moment between before and after

Still life was born in the great Baroque era, when fine art in fact realized itself as independent strength. 

























The name of this series "Dorogie Kovriki" could be translated as "expansive small rugs". All paintings from the series are connected by a frontal composition with a sculpture look-a-like object and patterned background. Some defines these works as still life's, other see them as part of pop-art movement, truth is somewhere in the middle. Alexander Lufer deliberately contraposes colors, shapes, meanings and patterns, because exactly this contrast helps him to find harmony and balance of every artwork of "Dorogie Kovriki" series. To confirm these concept artist uses a combination of an extremely realistic, clean and sleek performance and absolutely unrealistic plot. This series is especially appreciated by people prone to irony and self-irony. This series was a beginning of the "new age" for Alexander Lufer's art.
